

Gladys Jane Tomalty took one year of public school at Newton Centre, MA. In 1935 she and Norval Warren Blair, her husband, moved to Saskatoon to live. Since 1950 Norval has been a salesman for Dodge and DeSoto automobiles. Gladys visited her mother in the fall of 1951.

§' PBBDEC Gordon Robert Tomalty, born December 26, 1892. On November 17, 1920 he married Mina Margaret Dixon, a school teacher, at Dalesville, QC. Mina, born on October 14, 1899 was the daughter of Ann and David Dixon. He farmed until he moved to Brownsburg, QC. Was an Orangeman and was once Master of Louisa Orange Lodge. He helped his mother on the farm during World War I, so was exempt from military service. They had 3 children.

Gordon Robert Tomalty died October 14, 1945. He had a bad heart attack one night, and about a week later suffered a stroke. He had much pain and was sent to a hospital. He lived just two weeks, dying of coronary thrombosis. His home was close to his sisters Gertrude and Alma.

Mina and her family now live in Brownsburg, QC. Gordon farmed the home place at Louisa until he moved to Brownsburg in 1927, where he carried on a draying and trucking business until his death. Mina died on January 22, 1982. Gordon and Mina are buried at Lachute Protestant Cemetery.

'PBBDECA Norma Eleanor Tomalty, born June 10, 1922 at Louisa, QC. She received her education in the Brownsburg Consolidated School and is in the civil service, employed by the Dominion Government as a postal clerk.

PBBDECB Alvin Morrison Dixon Tomalty, born November 25, 1926 at Louisa, QC. He attended Brownsburg Consolidated School and Montreal Technical School. He was employed in Montreal by the Canadian National Railways exhibiting displays, and also did sign displaying there for the Taylor Advertising Co.. He is now a supervisor. of a division of the Canadian Industries, Ltd., in Brownsburg, QC. He is fond of sports and has won several awards in athletics. He is a star on his hockey team. On July 21, 1951 he married at Lachute, Rosella Esther Ann Newton, daughter of Leslie Newton and wife of Buckingham, QC.

⁄PBBDECC Frances Gladys Tomalty, born November 1, 1927 at Brownsburg, QC. After attending the Brownsburg Consolidated School she took a course in beauty culture and graduated from Trudeau's Academy, Montreal. She is now operating her own business, Frankie's Beauty Salon, in Brownsburg, QC. Frances is active in several young people's organizations, sings in the Baptist church choir, and likes sports, especially swimming and skiing.

“PBBDED Alma Margaret Tomalty, born March 8, 1894. Like her younger sister, she stayed at home after finishing public school, until she married on December 22, 1915, George W. Cresswell.

Alma Margaret Tomalty married George Wellington Cresswell at Louisa, QC. He was the son of Ann Scarborough and Joseph Cresswell. They live in Brownsburg, QC, where George is employed in the Canadian Industries, Ltd.. He and Alma are members of the Maple Avenue Baptist Church in Brownsburg and are active in other community affairs. They have one son, Robert.

J PBBDEDA Robert George Cresswell, born October 18, 1924 at Brownsburg, where he attended high school and later Montreal Technical. He was in the Royal Canadian Navy voluntary reserve and was 7 months at sea. On October 9, 1948 Rev. M.L. Orchard at Ottawa, ON, married Robert and Inez Sophia Wilson, daughter of Alice Furgeson and James Wilson of St. John, N.B., who was born September 3, 19\_\_ . They have Carol Alice. Robert is a machinist in the Canadian Industries, Ltd., and lives in Brownsburg, QC.

- \*' PBBDEE Gertrude Mary Tomalty, born December 13, 1898. On March 31, 1920 she married William Heatlie Tomalty, who was born July 31, 1896 to Agnes Calder and Arthur Tomalty of Mt. Maple, QC. They live at Brownsburg, QC, and have 2 children: Linton, born c. 1921, and Elinor, born c. 1935. On March 19, 1946 Gertrude wrote: "My husband is not working at the C.I.L. now, but he still drives the mail. Sugar making is in progress now. Linton is at home with us this winter. He reached home from overseas on July 31, 1945, his Dad's birthday, so that was the very best present we could get any day. He got his discharge in September and went to work 2 days later. He was made foreman over the nylon department here in plastics. When he finished his wireless course he was presented with the Badge of Honour for coming first in ail subjects in his class, so he was left as a sergeant only a few minutes while the wings parade was on; then he was promoted to pilot officer. Willie and I were glad we went up to his graduation in Toronto. I was thankful he was left in Canada so long. He was overseas only six months. His rank was Flying Officer in the R.C.A.F.. He is almost 6 feet tall and weighed 187 lbs. when in uniform. Elinor seems tall for her age, but the last year has been very thin. Last year on her Xmas report she ranked first out of 32 pupils but got scarlet fever at school and dangerously sick and had to miss 3 months of school. She and my mother celebrate their birthdays together. We celebrated our 25th.anniversary last year, had a lovely evening, and were presented with a swell box of silver and many other gifts." On May 7, 1950 Gertrude wrote: "Linton has been at home with us since he returned from overseas. He is still foreman. Elinor is in grade IX and is taller than I am. Last winter we had a nice long visit from Sadie (PBBDAE), her husband, and son. It's the first time we ever met, but we have written for years. They are a lovely couple. My mother seems to be failing fast. She was 84 on January 4th We sent her name in to the radio station and she was lucky in getting the lovely bouquet of flowers. She makes me think since she is older of Grandma Jane Parker Morrison."
- / PBBDEEA Linton Robert Tomalty, born January 19, 1921 at Louisa, QC. He is now senior foreman in the nylon division at the Canadian Industries, Ltd., in Brownsburg, QC, where he lives. He is now busy building his own home. He plays hockey and is fond of hunting and fishing. See preceding account.
- / PBBDEEB Elinor Mary Tomalty, born January 4, 1935 at Brownsburg, QC, where in 1951 she completed the high school. She is now attending Commercial College at Lachute, QC. See preceding account.
- J PBBDF Elizabeth Morrison born February 3, 1868 at the Glen. In her late teens she went to Boston, MA. She married Charles Louis Jones, February 2, 1898, and lived at Greenwich, Warren, and Ware, MA. He and Elizabeth were married at Greenwich, MA, and lived on a farm there. Charles was the son of Lyman Jones and Mary Thresher. They had 4 children; Ruby, Ruth, Oliver, and Samuel. Ruth died when c. 8 years old, and Samuel was in bed for 27 years and died when c. 37 or 40 years old. Ruby married and is now Mrs. Ruby Edwards, 48 Cherry Street, Springfield, MA. Ruth and Sammie died before their mother did, July 5, 194\_. Rubie and Oliver are still living. Elizabeth died in 1941 or 1943, July 5.
- ' PBBDFA Ruby Morrison Jones, born December 22, 1898 at Greenwich. On September 1, 1920 she married Albert Edwards. Rubie has had a brilliant scholastic standing and has held prominent positions in several business firms as secretary or accountant. Relationships

A 4-letter person in this (PBB) pedigree is a child of the 3-letter person, PBB. A 5-letter person is a grandchild of PBB, Edward Parker. A 6-letter person is a great grandchild of PBB. A 7-letter person is a great great grandchild of PBB. First cousins have the same

grandparents. Second cousins have the same great grandparents. Third cousins have the same great great grandparents. Fourth cousins have the same great great great grandparents.

The children of first cousins are second cousins. The children of second cousins are third Cousins; etc. The child of your first cousin is your first cousin-once-removed. The child of your first cousin-once-removed is your first cousin-twice removed; etc. The child of your second cousin is your second-cousin-once-removed; etc..

A grand-uncle or great-aunt is your parent's uncle or aunt. A grand (or great) nephew is your first cousin's child. With this information you should be able to figure out your relationship to any one in the PBB pedigree.

A few land patents in Gore Township may be of interest. To Thomas Morrison the west half of lot 8 in range 1 was sold May 1, 1856, and patented to his heirs on November 3, 1875. To Thomas Morrison, Sr., the east half of lot 16, range 1 was sold on May 1, 1856, and patented to his heirs on March 12, 1867. To Henry Morrison the east half of lot 1, range 4, was sold on May 1, 1856, and patented to John Morrison on October 26, 1883 by the deeds of sale: Henry Morrison, Sr., to Isabelle Kennedy, on the 26th of October, 1874, and Isabelle Kennedy, widow of H. Morrison, to John Morrison, her son, on April 14, 1877. To Henry Morrison the west half of lot 2 (80 acres), range 4, was sold on May 1, 1856, and patented to John Morrison, as in the preceding item. To Wm. Hess, Wm. Morrison, and Thos. McNeil the west half of lot 1, range 5 on April 15, 1856.

Henry Morrison and Isabelle Kennedy were the parents of William and James Morrison, who married Elizabeth and Jane Parker in 1857. It is interesting how many of their descendants received the name Isabelle from their ancestress, Isabelle Kennedy Morrison.
